You must delve deeply into the field you wish to practice to gain the critical thinking and communication skills that will transform you into a great leader.

For Florida Southern's most talented undergraduates, the Honors Program provides the guidance and flexibility you need to begin this great ascent. And because the path to success isn't the same for everyone, your experiences will be tailored to your individual strengths and interests, further enriching your understanding and providing greater insights into your specific discipline.

PROGRAM BENEFITS

In addition to small, interactive classes led by the College's most honored faculty, special lectures and symposia, and a rich array of social events, you'll benefit from additional resources to propel you along your career path.

Priority Registration/Additional Credit

Honors students receive priority registration to ensure they can integrate their Honors requirements into their degree program. They also can take up to 20 credit hours per semester at no additional cost.

Honors Housing and Study Spaces

Though it is not required, our Honors-only housing first-year option allows you to build relationships with students who are as passionate about learning as you. In fact, 90 percent of our Honors students choose to be part of a special living and learning community housed in the Barnett Residential Life Center. Additionally, you'll have access to the Honors lounge which provides a private space for quiet study, collaboration, and socializing.

Application Assistance

All students have access to writing specialists that will assist in applying for prestigious scholarships, such as Fulbright and Rhodes, as well as assistance in preparing personal statements for graduate, law, and medical school applications.

An Honors Degree

When you complete the Honors curriculum (see the following pages), you will receive an Honors degree — the highest undergraduate degree available at Florida Southern. Graduating with an Honors Degree provides convincing evidence of rigorous scholarly inquiry and academic achievement — an accomplishment sought-after by graduate and professional schools as well as top employers.





LEARN TO THINK BIG

The one characteristic that separates the most successful people from the rest begins with a single ability — to see things from a wider and more far-reaching perspective. This skill, if cultivated, develops over time into the empowering habit of thinking big that eventually takes over a person's psychology, and catapults them towards the achievement of their goals and objectives.

Choosing to participate in the Honors Program is your chance to learn to think broadly. With an emphasis on scholarly inquiry, you'll work collaboratively with faculty and peers from other disciplines while enriching your understanding and gaining greater insight into your own major. All the while, you'll hone your critical thinking and communication skills transforming you into you into an effective leader.

LAYING A FOUNDATION

Your first year will equip you with the tools needed to become an exceptional scholar. Our Honors Writing and Public Speaking courses ask you to examine how culture shapes and is shaped by our communication practices. Through interdisciplinary discussions led by faculty from multiple disciplines, you'll be challenged to analyze and pose solutions to problems facing our society. The issue to be tackled changes each semester. Whether you're taking on fake news, climate change, or wrongful convictions, these seminars are shaped to provide you with broader insights while furthering your abilities to think, write, and speak critically about the biggest questions in contemporary Western culture.

CREATE YOUR OWN UNDERSTANDING

In your second year, you'll continue to broaden your awareness by taking individualized honors courses outside your discipline. Are you a biologist? Learn to write poetry. Are you a poet? Gain the knowledge needed to start a small business. Are you an accountant? Why not study the works of Plato and Aristotle? Exploring topics beyond your field of expertise enables you to integrate new knowledge with previously held notions. Not only does this type of interdisciplinary study lead to exciting research topics, it often results in seeing the world in a whole new light!

Most Honors courses apply to graduation requirements by fulfilling general education, major, or elective obligations — allowing you to graduate within the typical time frame.

SOPHOMORE HONORS RESEARCH SEMINAR

Would you like to conduct research that results in a major presentation or possibly a professional publication? To reach these heights, we recognize that building research skills needs to happen early in your college career. During your sophomore year, you'll take an introductory course that prepares you to conduct research or engage in creative works. You'll learn the principles, procedures, and methods for designing research and creative works while preparing you to select a faculty collaborator. Together, you'll begin to develop an idea for your senior project.

For example, when biology major **Jasmine Childress '15** joined Dr. Gabriel Langford, associate professor of biology and former director of the Honors Program in his laboratory, she was able to participate in a substantial research project that resulted in an article in the *Journal of Parasitology*, with her as co-author. “This research experience was critical in my decision to pursue a Ph.D. upon graduation — it was awesome,” says Jasmine.

YOUR SENIOR PROJECT

Each Honors experience is meant to prepare you for your senior project. With guidance from your faculty sponsor, you will propose a project and work toward completing it during your junior and senior years. “The research experience for students is important in that it's how science is actually done,” says Dr. An-Phong Le, associate professor of chemistry.

Honors students have worked with dolphins at Mote Marine Laboratories, looked at the impact of streaming services on the music industry, analyzed consumer reactions to corporations taking political stands, interpreted black women's historical fiction, and even written their own books of poetry.



After completing your project, you will have the opportunity to present your findings at our annual academic showcase, Fiat Lux.

Sound exciting? “It is,” confirms **Dr. Jennifer Bruno '11**, a former biology major who graduated from the University of South Florida Morsani College of Medicine. While at FSC, Jen worked closely with Professor Langford to design an ecological study looking at the parasite populations infecting the fish of Lake Hollingsworth. “Not only was this project immensely fun, but I also learned how to build a research study from the ground up, and we published a research note in a peer-reviewed scientific journal.”

Honors students generally represent the top ten percent of their class with at least a 3.5 weighted GPA, have taken significant advanced coursework, and demonstrate their readiness for the program through qualifications like awards, test scores, or submission of high-level academic work.
